■ Perth Training Center

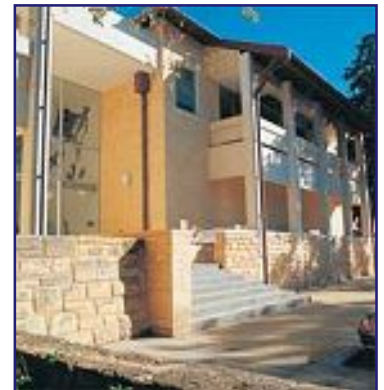
